Yes, pwd is the command, but the variable is called 'cwd'. pwd is the same as "echo \$cwd" And 'cwd' is a shell variable (in csh use command "set" to see them) and not an environment variable (in chs use "printenv"). And since is not in the environment (of the parent process of IDL) IDL won't getenv it.

And also remember that within IDL you can CD to a different directory without any effect on the shell. So consider the two (IDL and shell) fully disjoint environments.

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
