In my opinion you are best to use C to wrap your Fortran functions as dynamic linked modules (DLMS). Ronn Kling has a nice book which introduces the concepts of DLM programming in IDL (<http://www.kilvarock.com/>) but it assumes you are somewhat familiar with some C. Calling Fortran functions from C is well discussed in the Sun Workshop documents (<http://tulip.atm.ox.ac.uk/~rhskelto/documents/fortran/fortran-C.pdf>). I don't think there are too many differences for Windows programming, but I am not sure.

If you aren't feeling that brave, you can look through the examples of 'call_external' in the IDL external development guide. At least this will avoid the writing of text files...
