- > developed, stay tuned for the announcement by the new maintainer soon.
- > I will still be around, helping to fix things, but also actually using
- > IDL instead of writing Emacs code.

- > lot. I hope IDLWAVE has been and will continue to be useful to many
- > people here. Thank you all for your encouragement and feedback.
