: worry about the product each time you update. So when a new version

: comes out you have to go through all the numerous steps involved, even if

: you have 10 users. Or you decide not to update for that environment and

: annoy the hell out of those 10 customers.

I suspect it's more of a marketing dilemma. If the Unix version is approx 5-8K how much can you charge for the Linux version which is identical in functionality. People running a free OS on a 2-3K Pentium box are not likely to spend more than a few hundred bucks for it.
