- > I can ping the server from home successfully, I see the modem send/receive

I don't know what the problem is here, but I had a similar problem recently when I would try to send mail from remote sites. Usually these were addresses that had been sending a lot of SPAM mail.

The fact that other people can do it and you can't just caused me to recall that stupid "Well, it is suppose to work" response I kept getting from the technical support people. :-(
