   Netscape 4.x - use successive "ctrl + ]" commands
   Netscape 6.x, Mozila, Thunderbird - use successive "ctrl + +" commands (do not hit
"shift" kev)
  IE 5.x
             - on the "View" menu, point to "Text Size" and click the size you want
To decrease font size:
   Netscape 4.x - use successive "ctrl + [" commands
   Netscape 6.x, Mozilla, Thunderbird - use successive "ctrl + -" commands
