IDL> Help, (-0.1)^2.0
<Expression>  FLOAT  =  0.0100000
IDL> Help, (-0.1)^2.01
<Expression>  FLOAT  =  -NaN
```

In general, raising a negative number to any integer power seems to produce a real number, whereas raising a negative number to a non-integer power causes a NAN.
