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I would recommend just using dcmk (www.dcmk.org) to convert your images. It will probably be faster than anything written in IDL.

In any case, it is part of the DICOM standard that an application entity (DICOM node) should support uncompressed transmission of images. Thus, theoretically you should be able to receive the file in uncompressed form. This is the part where I rant about that DICOM is not a file-format, it is a network protocol blah-blah-blah.
