OK. I'll see if I can start the page off with something selected in the category section. I'll also put in an explanation of how to use it, which will be ignored, of course :-). If anything is selected (category, question or answer), you'll get a real response. If nothing is selected, it should probably do the same thing as if "Find all records" was selected. Currently, you'll get no records found when nothing is selected with either "And" or "Or" selected. Technically correct, but not intuitive.

Some folks have asked about archives previously through the newsgroup or email, I have a direct newsfeed now. This is different from just a newsreader, since I actually receive the feed automatically and can server it out to other systems. I need to write some software to extract the articles from the newsfeed and put them into a format the database can read. Once this happens, I'll put them into a searchable database. I expect to use Subject, Author and Body for search areas. Let me know if something else would be helpful.
